Seasearch Orkney and Shetland Surveys 2022



The following pages summarise the main activities undertaken in 2022. The map (below) shows the distribution of Seasearch surveys carried out in Orkney throughout 2022.

A total of 55 survey forms were completed, 48 Observer and 7 Surveyor forms at sites throughout Orkney mainland and the surrounding islands of Sanday, Shapinsay, Hoy, Flotta and Cava.

This was a diverse combination of diver, snorkel, beach walks and Baited Remote Underwater Video surveys.

Stromness Museum Shoreside Ramble


15th July 2022

Seasearch teamed up with the Stromness Museum and Kraken Diving to provide a day of informative snorkelling activities.



Participants were given a tour of the museum's natural history collection and a short talk about Seasearch and marine nature in Orkney seas

before donning drysuits and snorkels to look themselves. Each participant was given a spotting sheet of key intertidal and shallow subtidal species so they could record what they saw underwater. The Seasearch coordinator was on the surface with ID guides and to help with any questions. All the presence data from the day was collated into a single Seasearch Observer form by the coordinator during the activity so that participants could see their sightings records making a difference.






Orkney Nature Youth Collective

Big Kids Rock-Pooling Afternoon 12th August 2022

Seasearch supported the ONYC led event at Birsay Bay by providing ID guides and information on the species found by rock-pooling and snorkelling volunteers. Specimens were collected and placed in tanks for the public to view and learn more about. This was a popular event run as part of the yearly Orkney Nature Festival, it was a fantastic opportunity to talk about Seasearch with the local community and tourists.





Seasearch Orkney and Shetland were involved in several collaborative citizen science projects, the details of which are summarised below.

Orkney Skate Trust



Seasearch are assisting The Orkney Skate Trust with their citizen science led research activities throughout Orkney by collecting Seasearch data from SCUBA dives, Baited Remote Underwater Cameras (BRUVs) and drop camera surveys conducted around Orkney's waters looking for evidence of flapper skate and flapper skate egg laying habitat. This is an ongoing project that will run throughout 2023.

Seasearch Scotland have been out and about recently assisting Orkney Skate Trust (supported by SSEN Transmission) collecting data in some of the lesser dived areas around Orkneys coastline. Whilst the hopes is to come across flapper/blue skates and their eggs, there is so much interesting, important and vital habitat and species information we can gain from every dive that captures the diversity of life within these magical waters . DNA Divers

Seasearch in collaboration with Halton Charters are assisting DNA divers with the collection of eDNA data around Orkney by conducting dives and snorkels in various locations so that eDNA data can be compared with data obtained on Seasearch forms. Researchers from Liverpool John Moore's University travelled to Orkney to train the Seasearch coordinator and crew of the Clasina in how to collect and process the eDNA data. This is an ongoing project that will run throughout 2023. The aim is to conduct repeat surveys over several key areas throughout Orkney.

Training Courses

Seasearch Orkney and Shetland ran one online Observer course aimed at snorkellers throughout August 2022. This was largely run for the Northern Isles Landscape Partnership Trust with the aim of bringing together the communities throughout Orkney's outer islands. The course was delivered online over a week with the practical element conducted throughout the day at Barrier 3 on Orkney mainland.






Several interesting species were highlighted throughout the year using social media which led


to an increase in online discussion and local reports of sightings and how to report them.
