Rare Nudibranches Reported

Des Glover of Kennack Divers found this beautiful pair of nudibranches while shore diving at Drawna Rocks Porthkerris. The species was identified as Felimida krohni. the first record of this species in UK waters. Since then one specimen has also been found on the Eddystone reef.



Crawfish Sighted 2018 was an amazing year for sightings of *Palinurus elephas,* the crawfish or spiny lobster. Huge numbers were seen by divers, all around Cornwall but particularly in and around Falmouth Bay. We urge people to continue to report crawfish sightings using the Seasearch Crawfish reporting form. Please email Seasearch@cornwallwildifetrust.org.uk for more info. Crawfish are extremely vulnerable to fishing and over-collection by

divers and we hope that this recent welcome population explosion which has brought them back from virtual extinction results in them becoming permanent visitors and they don't get over fished again.





Manacles MCZ Dive Expedition

Thanks to Sea-changers we carried out a two day expedition recording marine life within the Manacles MCZ. Huge populations of the rare sea fan anemone were found living around Gwinges reef, crawfish were spotted to the South of the MCZ at Lowlands point and Puskys reef. 


Newquay MCZ Dive Expedition

Thanks to funding from Sea-changers and a discounted charter price from Atlantic Diving, we organised a weekend of fabulous subsidised seasearch dive surveys within and around Newquay and the Gannel MCZ in May. The highlights of the weekend included recording 10 juvenile crawfish on Poltexas reef just to the north east of the MCZ. Seasearchers Mark Parry and James Wright



were visited by a grey seal – identified by Cornwall Seal group as Pebbles, a female rehabilitated by National Seal Sanctuary in 2007 and released at Porthtowan.
